Outline of what is on Paul's heart as he signs off:

Colossians 4:7-9 - The <u>messenger</u> is critical and should remind us that each of us is a messenger on a <u>mission</u> for God in our sphere of <u>influence</u>.

Colossians 4:10-11 - Jewish believers: Our ministry partners matter.

Colossians 4:12-14 - Gentile believers: Prayer partners matter.

Colossians 4:15-18 - We need to be reminded to get involved and stay the course.

Conclusions: There is no long term ministry without <u>partners</u>. These listed men demonstrate the importance of obeying God's call in church life for the blessing of God's people.

There are no insignificant servants who serve God and his people.

There is no service so insignificant that it has no <u>eternal</u> value.

There is no service beneath a servant of the Lord.

There is no servant who is less than a <u>child</u> of the King and a <u>brother</u> for all time.

Paul's final words remind us that in God's economy there are no ethnicities; only family.

In the family of God there should be hearts that are growing <u>large</u> towards the kingdom of God and the family of God; this is the nature of ministry and nothing is too great a sacrifice for God and his people. Everyone has a <u>place</u>, everyone has a <u>ministry</u> while all serve the Master, the only one who can <u>permanently</u> change a life.
