"King of kings"

Matthew 21:1-17; Mark 11:1-11; Luke 19:28-48; John 12:12-26

Introduction: The Gospel writers provide us with a four-dimensional picture of what we call Palm Sunday. There are four points of view: the <u>disciples</u>, the <u>crowd</u>; the religious leaders and <u>Jesus</u>.

<u>Disciples</u> - What did the Disciples sense as Jesus commanded this donkey and rode into Jerusalem? Matthew 20:17-19; John 10:14-18; 14:25-30; 16:17-20. In spite of all of this the disciples were <u>blinded</u> (Luke 9:51-62).

Concept: Being close to Jesus, interacting daily with Jesus, listening and watching Jesus did not open the eyes of these disciples to the mission of Jesus.

<u>Crowd</u> - This story is really about <u>two</u> crowds, one that came from Jerusalem and the other, much smaller, that came with Jesus down the Mount of Olives from Bethany. (Psalm 118:25-26; Zechariah 9:9-10) What they did not know was that Jesus would make <u>two appearances</u>.

Precept: Jesus first came to establish his kingdom in the <u>hearts</u> of people then he would return and establish that <u>kingdom</u> over all the earth. Which is more difficult, which costs God the most?

<u>Religious Leaders</u> - The Sanhedrin took form during that period of time we call 'Second <u>Temple</u> Judaism' or the 'Four Hundred <u>Silent</u> Years' between the Biblical Testaments.

Precept: The <u>symbols</u> of our faith are not our faith. We must hold them <u>loosely</u> and see them for what they are, symbols, but not the <u>real</u> thing.

<u>Jesus</u> - Does Jesus know what is actually happening in this story? Yes! (2 Samuel 7:6-16; <u>Hebrews 9:11-12</u>).

Concept: As Jesus was <u>presented</u> before God, <u>sheep</u> were being prepared before the Jews. (Matthew 1:21; <u>Acts 2:22-24</u>)

Conclusion: At this event Jesus had not yet died and everyone around this event is clueless that Jesus would surrender to the cross. They were <u>ill-informed</u> and at the same time <u>passionate</u> about their feelings. We are not caught in that web; we are well informed but are we passionate about this event and what this event led to; the <u>cross</u>. (1 Corinthians 1:18-25) What am I passionate about and does it matter for <u>eternity</u>?

At Lazarus' tomb Jesus shed tears of <u>grief</u> at the death of his friend. In Luke's story Jesus weeps publicly, openly, visually while the crowd cheered him; he was <u>broken hearted</u> at their lack of understanding, their spiritual naiveté and blindness. Which grief was <u>greater</u>? Death is inevitable but spiritual <u>blindness</u> is not.

The disciples would eventually learn that the journey that Jesus took to the cross would be a path that they would have to take after he <u>returned</u> to heaven. The same crowd that cheered Jesus on Monday called for his <u>crucifixion</u> on Friday. Jesus' first journey to earth was one of humiliation; suffering; rejection and pain. This was the journey of <u>love</u> and Jesus' <u>followers</u> are called to walk this journey. (<u>Hebrews 12:1-2</u>)
