Walking by Faith

Genesis 12:1-9

Introduction: Abram's story follows Noah's as he too trusted God and built an ark that saved him and his family. Noah's story is about <u>one</u> act of faith; Abram's story is a <u>journey</u> that starts with one act that leads him to the position as the <u>Father</u> of all who walk by faith.

God's Call - Genesis 12:1

<u>First</u>, Abram understood what God said to him, it was intelligible; <u>second</u>, Abram sensed that it was <u>real</u>, he was not dreaming; and <u>third</u>, he sensed the <u>urgency</u> of the words, "So, Abram went, as the Lord had told him".

Precept: In Genesis 12:1 we should understand that Abram was a <u>pagan idol</u> worshipper when God called him.

Concept: Abram had no reason to trust God but he did; I, on the other hand have many reasons to hear God and trust God. (John 10:14-16; 25-27)

Abram's Call: Genesis 12:1-4 - The call of Abram has three parts. The call of Abram consisted of (1) a <u>call</u> to move, (2) a <u>promise</u> associated with the call, and (3) 'instant' <u>obedience</u> from Abram. (Romans 10:14-17)

God's Promise - Genesis 12:2-3, 7a

It is interesting that none of this came true in <u>Abram's</u> life time (Hebrews 11:8-16; Genesis 15:6; Romans 4:3).

Precept: God is a promise-maker and a promise-keeper.

Abram's Obedience - Genesis 12:4-9

Obeying God has some <u>immediate</u> blessings and at times <u>long term</u> benefits; either way obeying God is good and is the evidence that faith has <u>birthed</u> and is <u>growing</u>.

Principles of Faith

<u>First</u>, God <u>initiates</u> contact and our obedience is the evidence of faith; our <u>disobedience</u> is the evidence of unbelief (Hebrew 3:7-19). <u>Sinai</u> and the <u>incarnation</u> are prime examples.

<u>Second</u>, God's only message to unbelievers is <u>follow me</u>. God's message to believers comes from His <u>Word</u> without, His <u>Holy Spirit</u> within, and His sovereign purposes <u>around</u>.

<u>Third</u>, we hear God's voice best when we obey what we know to be the <u>revealed</u> will of God. We struggle to know God's will when we <u>selectively</u> listen and obey.

Fourth, living by faith can be counter-cultural and contrary to economic security.

<u>Fifth</u>, Obeying God is the first <u>principle</u> of faith and also the first <u>step</u> of faith. When Abram moved he took the first step in a <u>lifelong</u> journey of trusting God.
