## The Covenant Maker

Genesis 15:1-21

**Introduction**: In the text of Genesis there are two <u>unilateral</u> covenants. In Exodus we read about a <u>bilateral</u> covenant that God makes through <u>Moses</u> at Mount Sinai and In 2 Samuel 1 we read about one other unilateral covenant that God made with <u>David</u>.

There are two things going on in this story, <u>firs</u>t, the conversation between God and Abram that establishes the <u>Abrahamic</u> Covenant, and <u>second</u>, an introduction to the 'doctrine of <u>iustification</u>'.

**Concept**: When our faith is challenged we often try and work things out and all the while God waits for us to come to the end of our <u>internal</u> wrangling. (<u>Psalm 46:10</u>)

**The Promise**: God promised Abram that he would <u>protect</u> him, <u>reward</u> him greatly, give him a host of <u>offspring</u> and give him the <u>land</u> that he could see with his eyes, with the description in verses 18-20. That promise was made to Abram alone.

**Divine Justification** - When I stand before God I stand alone in my <u>own</u> righteousness or I stand in righteousness that has been <u>imputed</u> or gifted to me. Divine Justification is God standing before me and seeing the righteousness of <u>Jesus Christ</u>, which is imputed to me, and my <u>sinfulness</u>, which has been imputed to Jesus Christ at the <u>cross</u>.

<u>The Ritual</u> - In the ancient world "agreeing" in the marketplace was ritualized in a number of ways; with something similar to a <u>handshake</u> in the modern world, or a complex document or contract in a legally <u>binding</u> transaction. (<u>Ruth 4:7-10</u>)

<u>Celebration Ceremony</u> - Genesis 15:12-21 - In a ceremony where both parties were to participate, <u>Abram</u> is caught in a deep sleep, darkness fell on him such that he is unable to participate (17); and God walked this trail of blood alone.

**Conclusion**: God is a <u>covenant maker</u>. At the cross God did all the work, and I must simply believe by placing my trust and faith in Jesus alone for my completed future <u>salvation</u>. God the Father <u>chose</u> us, God the Son <u>died</u> for us and God the Holy Spirit <u>sealed</u> us for the day of redemption (Ephesians 1:3-14).

God has certain habits and predictable patterns because God is a <u>promise keeper</u>. If God said it we can count on it. Walking by faith is <u>believing</u> God and <u>acting</u> upon His promises.

When I believe God something happens that initiates the greatest blessings that God can bestow, God counts that belief as <u>righteousness</u> (Genesis 15:6; John 3:16; Acts 16:31; Hebrews 3:19) and salvation follows.

God <u>sees</u> things I do not see, God <u>plans</u> things that I am not privy to, God is <u>sovereign</u> in the affairs of mankind and I can be clueless about it; but be sure that God is over all and his plans are sure and <u>my</u> future is secured by His plans. I learn from Genesis 15:13-16 that God's plans go well beyond my life, he has <u>history</u> planned out, because it is <u>his story</u> and I, we are privileged to live in it - Thank God that he is a <u>Covenant Maker!</u>
