Gratitude & Generosity

Genesis 13-14

Introduction: There are three stories of Abram and Lot, <u>Genesis 13</u> relates their separation; <u>Genesis 14</u> relates Abram's concern for Lot even after the separation and <u>Genesis 19</u> relates Abram's anxiety for Lot as he learns of Sodom and Gomorrah's coming demise.

Genesis 13:1-18 - Abram & Lot - People and Stuff

Concept: In Genesis 12 circumstances pushed Abram to make a decision that was based in <u>fear</u>. Here we have another circumstance that pushes two men to make a decision that is rooted in <u>conflict</u>. (Genesis 13:10)

Deference Defined – An act of <u>faith</u> that God will use the person <u>over</u> me to make a decision for me that fits into <u>God's will</u> for my life.

When I insist on my own way God will defer to me and sin will take its course.

Precept: We exercise <u>faith</u> when we defer a decision to a person <u>over us</u>, with more experience, who <u>cares</u> about us, or can guide our <u>eves</u> to see things that God sees. This is an act of faith.

Genesis 14:1-24 - Melchizedek - Psalm 110:3-5; Hebrews 5:6, 10; 6:20; 7:1, 10, 17, 22

Summary: <u>First</u>, we marry into the <u>life</u> of a family and Abram has little choice regarding Lot, they are relatives. <u>Second</u>, it can take wisdom to know how to respond to a <u>wayward</u> family members, but responding is important. <u>Third</u>, Abram is wise enough to not take spoils from his victory and so <u>detaches</u> himself from the drama and paganism of Sodom. <u>Finally</u>. Abram's actions tell me that he does everything he can to disassociate from Sodom while caring for his nephew and his family.

Conclusion: There are three statements of the promise by God to Abram and each comes after Abram is called to '<u>separate himself</u>' from something/someone he loves; Genesis <u>12:1-3</u>; Genesis <u>13:14</u>; Genesis <u>22:15-18</u>. Following God is a call to put everything behind <u>God</u> and his will for your life.

Lot's <u>eves</u> were stronger than his <u>will</u>; because his heart was filled with <u>lust</u> for the wrong things in life. Genesis 13:10 - Lot made three moves; "moved his <u>tent</u> as far as Sodom" (13:12); "dwelling <u>in</u> Sodom" (14:12); and "in the <u>gate</u> of Sodom" (19:1). (2 Peter 2:6-11) <u>Saved so as by fire</u>.

The end of this story is the interaction of Abram with two kings, Melchizedek (14:18-20) and the King of Sodom (14:21-24). Abram gives the king of Salem a tithe and he takes nothing from the King of Sodom. (Deuteronomy 20:15-18)
