The Way of the Lord

Genesis 18

Introduction:

The Oaks of Mamre - In modern Hebron

Sodom, Gomorrah, Adamah, Zeboiim & Zoar formed a 'pentapolis'

<u>Three Guests</u> - Genesis 18:1-15 - The <u>critical</u> statement is, "Is anything too hard for the Lord?" what God says to Abraham and <u>Sarah</u> certainly heard him say it.

Summary: <u>First</u>, God <u>pursued</u> his own persistently until the written word was available. <u>Second</u>, it was Abraham's faith thus far and it was time for <u>Sarah</u> to hear from God.

Question: What does God do to bring us along spiritually?

<u>Ones' Determination</u> - Genesis 18:16-33 - True obedience - <u>Deuteronomy 30:6</u>; <u>Jeremiah</u> 31:33

Summary: The combination of the Genesis event and the parable of Jesus should tell us that pleading with God is <u>encouraged</u>. God cares about <u>justice</u>, but we often care about the <u>timing</u> more than the justice and we must trust <u>God</u> to know the important distinction.

Conclusion: "Is anything to hard for God?" The hard thing is to believe that <u>nothing</u> is too hard for God! Sarah is so certain that she laughs at the suggestion of having a child yet she gets pregnant in 3 months and 9 months later gives birth to <u>Isaac</u> (Genesis 21:1-3).

(Genesis 18:22-32; Luke 18:1-8) Abraham intercedes for his <u>nephew</u> and the widow intercedes for <u>herself</u>. There is no difference regarding the <u>object</u> of intercession; the issue is interceding in <u>earnest</u> and for what you believe to be a <u>just</u> cause. God loves when we intercede for what is '<u>right</u>'!

<u>God</u> is concerned with Abraham's goal and the blessing of all nations; <u>Abraham</u> is concerned with the people who live in Sodom and his nephew <u>Lot</u>. One of the blessings that Sodom was unaware of; <u>who</u> was concerned for their <u>survival</u>. Don't give up on your lost or wayward loved ones!

The only person able to enter and survive in a pagan <u>evil</u> environment is the <u>Holy God</u>, and he came on a mission to show us the way out, Jesus Christ whose birth we celebrate; but it was the <u>reverse</u> in this story. When Lot left Sodom it was for <u>his good</u>, when Jesus left heaven it was for <u>our good</u>; at Christmas we thank <u>God</u> for that glorious distinction.
