Jacob & Esau

Genesis 32-33

Introduction: Three parts, Managing internal <u>Fear</u> (Genesis 32:1-21); Wrestling with <u>God</u> (Genesis 32:22-32); and Lasting <u>Peace</u> (Genesis 33).

Managing internal Fear - Genesis 32:1-21

Summary: In this part of the story all we come to understand is what is going on inside of <u>Jacob</u>; we have no insight into what it going on inside of Esau.

<u>Wrestling with God</u> – Genesis 32:22-32 – Jacob sends his family ahead and spent the night alone and "met a man who wrestled with him until the break of the next day."

Precept: The <u>blessing</u> of God is not something that we can <u>force</u> from God, that we can <u>manipulate</u> for ourselves; when God chooses to bless us we can't make it happen <u>sooner</u> and we can't cause its <u>delay</u>; <u>Jacob</u> needed to learn that hard lesson.

Conflict Resolution

"Submission to God assures reconciliation".

Four principles that govern a peacemaker and each flows from the scriptures.

1 Corinthians 10:31 - They seek to always glorify God

<u>Matthew 7:5</u> - They seek to first deal with the beam in their <u>own eye</u> before addressing any offense by owning up to their own part and more in the conflict.

<u>Matthew 18:15-17</u> - They speak <u>truth in love</u> as they confront things that are wrong by God's standards.

<u>Matthew 5:24</u> - They <u>choose</u> to be restored, to be fully reconciled ,to completely <u>forgive</u> and clear away any relational issues that prevent <u>Godly</u> interactions and genuine peace.

Lasting Peace - Genesis 33:1-20

There can be no true <u>reconciliation</u> until someone or both parties own up to what they have done and make it right with the other person. Reconciliation is the result of <u>confession/repentance</u> and <u>forgiveness</u>; when one is missing there is not reconciliation.

Conclusion: Peacemaking is not <u>peacekeeping</u>; peacekeepers value <u>relationship</u> over truth, and if necessary act contrary to <u>truth</u> to keep the peace.

Jim Van Yperen states, "Conflict is <u>God-purposed</u>... Peace is <u>God-provided</u>" (92). Conflict begins in the <u>individual</u> but is overcome within the <u>family</u>, and the <u>community</u>: all of these elements are communal; they are not individual; reconciliation is possible because it is of relationship.
