## Choosing a leader

1 Samuel 8-9

Introduction: Benjamin

1 Samuel 8:1-3

**Concept**: The most important thing in any succession model is that the Lord rules, and His word rules, the new leader.

1 Samuel 8:4-6

1 Samuel 8:7-9

Precept: All choices have consequences.

**Precept**: The leadership in the world knows the things of the world but the leadership 'amongst God's people' should know the things of the <u>kingdom of God</u>.

1 Samuel 8:10-18

1 Samuel 8:19-22

**Precept**: Consequences always follow choices and <u>God</u> determines the consequences.

Summary: Many things rise and fall on <u>leadership</u> and this story highlights that truth.

## Samuel Identifies a King

1 Samuel 9

There are two leadership roles in this story; and no one seems to have it "all together" but there are two men that God positions as leader, <u>Samuel</u> and <u>David</u>.

1 Samuel 9:1-17 - Genesis 49:8-10; 27 - Judah would produce Israel's leaders, Saul is not in that line.

1 Samuel 9:18-27 - Saul's divine appointment with Samuel

**Conclusion**: We should not overlook the greater narrative before us. Israel is in <u>crisis</u>; nevertheless <u>God</u> is working as his people wander.

Israel has been in the land for about 200 years and they have turned to these idol worshippers for direction as God's people, they seek <u>conformity</u> and hope for <u>security</u>.

God is not against a <u>king</u>; he was against the <u>motives</u> of Israel for a king; God also had different <u>timing</u> as the elders and Israel became impatient for security. They should have learned from the period of the <u>Judges</u> that doing what is right in one's own eyes is the true source of <u>trouble</u>—God is our king, we must follow Him.

Rejecting God's directions may seem good at the moment but in time it will prove <u>disastrous</u>. God's word is not up for <u>debate</u>, we must obey. Our choices will determine our <u>consequences</u>.
