God's Purposes

1 Samuel 10

Introduction:

A Divine Purpose - 1 Samuel 9:27 - 10:16 - It is important that we see the significance of verses 5-7.

Spirit of God - Saul was literally transformed from a rancher to a <u>warrior</u> and that came by the Holy Spirit of God—he became a new man with a new heart.

Ancient Leadership - Israel had a formal king <u>later</u> than the nations around it. Nevertheless, they had leadership at a <u>local level</u>. When the Israelites asked for a king God was not giving them what the nations around them had, God was setting up a vice-regent to carry out his responsibilities and fulfill God's <u>intended</u> purpose.

Summary: All leadership has a <u>divine</u> purpose as Saul had a divine purpose but his leadership is compromised because of his <u>willfulness</u>.

Stay on <u>purpose</u> and God will use you in His way and part of that is <u>preparing</u> things for those who follow.

Announcing a King - 1 Samuel 10:17-27 - In the ancient world leaders came to power under three general circumstances: <u>first</u>, they were identified by the <u>divine</u>; <u>second</u>, a <u>demonstration</u> by the new leader that gains public attention and results in growing <u>support</u>; <u>third</u>, a public <u>confirmation</u> of the new leader.

Summary: We will learn as Israe's history takes center stage in the historical books that the <u>prophet</u> has a leading role in the Kingdom of Israel; he speaks for God and the political leadership is challenged to listen and adjust their <u>priorities</u>.

Conclusion: God's <u>purposes</u> define the situation that existed in this story and they define the situation that we find ourselves in our $21^{\underline{st}}$ century historical times. God is working in the lives of his children and the Bible provides us with a <u>sketch</u> of what that program looks like right up the end of the age.

The language of this portion of Scripture indicates that Saul may be an <u>earthly king</u> of an earthly kingdom and that is what the people were looking for; but God is the King of the nations and he is looking for servants who will follow his lead and care for his inheritance as part of an <u>eternal kingdom</u>. God's purposes are <u>greater</u> than any moment in history; we are his servants, he is the King; follow the <u>King</u>.

The Torah required that the Levites provide the new king "a copy of this law, taken from that of the priests" (<u>Deuteronomy 17:18</u>). God was setting the stage for Saul's <u>success</u>, because, when God identifies our purpose he also gives us the <u>resources</u> to carry it out.
