Real Challenges

1 Samuel 11-12

Introduction: 2 Corinthians 10:3-6; Ephesians 6:1-11 - This story of Israel's first conflict under their new king (1 Samuel 11) should remind us that we are in a <u>battle</u> that requires all of us.

Precept: Saul is a team player here, he sends a message and we can't know why the people came in numbers, but most commentators agree that <u>Samuel</u> was the real draw; but <u>God</u> is working and the results prove <u>significant</u>.

Samuel's farewell: Samuel's <u>faithful</u> ministry (12:1-5); God's <u>witness</u> to Israel (12:6-15); Important <u>commitments</u> (12:16-25)

Samuel's Faithfulness - 1 Samuel 12:1-5 - <u>First</u>, Samuel submitted to <u>scrutiny</u> (12:3a). <u>Second</u>, identify how I have taken, defrauded, oppressed or been influenced? <u>Third</u>, I am prepared to make any and all things that are wrong, right. (John 3:20-21)

Precept: True faithfulness is characterized by meaningful <u>accountability</u> and both parties are honest and forthcoming.

God's Witness - 1 Samuel 12:6-15 - Samuel reminds Israel that God is always faithful, keeping his word and Israel's response is "they <u>forgot</u> the Lord their God" (12:9).

Precept: Real safety/security is not by human <u>sources</u>, led by armies and generals; real safety is standing <u>behind</u> the Lord, obeying and trusting him for what we face.

Important Commitments - 1 Samuel 12:16-24 - Samuel will <u>pray</u>; (12:23) and God will be faithful to his <u>promises</u> (12:22).

Precept: We know enough about God to know what to <u>expect</u> from Him; it's me, it's <u>us</u> that is the constant variable. (12:14-15, 24-25)

Conclusion: Structures and organization cannot change us; what's in our <u>hearts</u> and who we are truly committed to is far more important. What will God's people do with <u>God</u>? That is the real question; a <u>king</u> won't change a thing.

If we love people we are part of their <u>accountability</u> structure. Accountability is an abiding tool of spiritual <u>maturity</u>.

The covenant renewal at Gilgal is in a line of renewals for Israel (Exodus 32-35; Deuteronomy 29) and reminds us that God is full of <u>mercy and grace</u> towards his children. Yet Israel remains compromised. (<u>Matthew 18:21-22; 26:69-75</u>)

In the final analysis the most pressing issue was not the <u>external</u> problem of national leadership; it was in <u>internal</u> problem of faithfulness to the God.
