Samuel's Ministry

1 Samuel 7

Introduction: 1 Samuel 7:1-2 - Kiriath-jearim was not a Godly place; it was a cultic community

- Samuel's Leadership -

1 Samuel 7:3-11 - Samuel's <u>Influence</u> - <u>First</u>, Samuel called them to repentance (3-4); <u>Second</u>, Samuel challenged them to make their repentance a matter of <u>public record</u> (5-6).

Repentance: Intellectual — a recognition of sin that is an affront to a holy God. <u>Emotional</u> – this naturally leads to a sense of <u>sorrow</u> over our sin; (2 Corinthians 7:10). <u>Volitional</u> – Our will is changed to walk in the works and ways of the <u>Lord</u> Jesus Christ.

Concept: My <u>internal</u> standing before God is more important than what threatens me from without.

<u>Third</u>, they were attacked by the Philistines and asked Samuel to <u>pray</u> (7-8). <u>Fourth</u>, Samuel offered a whole burnt offering and <u>God</u> removed the trouble (9-11).

- 1 Samuel 7:12-14 Samuel's <u>Remembrance</u> This began a season of Philistine retreat and Israel's advance as God <u>restored</u> the borders of Israel (13-14).
- 1 Samuel 7:15-17 Samuel's <u>Consistency</u> This was Samuel's pattern and he consistently practiced it for his whole ministry. He was <u>predictable</u>.

- Spiritual Leadership -

Samuel's leadership points us to spiritual leadership and our chapter provides us with some of the basic things involved in spiritual leadership: <u>influence</u> and <u>consistency</u>.

Spiritual leadership is not a certain <u>skill set</u>, it's an <u>unambiguous</u> commitment to the most important things and the strength of will to keep those things in there proper place.

Conclusion: Repentance is a <u>mark/theme</u> in 1 & 2 Samuel. First, "We have sinned against the Lord." Second, (1 Samuel 15). <u>Saul</u> did not repent. He was more concerned with what people thought than what he had done to God. Third, 2 Samuel 12:13 - when David is confronted by Nathan the prophet (Psalm 51). Repentance is an important step in coming to God <u>by faith</u> and <u>living</u> for God in faith. Without <u>repentance</u> we are deceived.

Repentance moves \underline{God} as well; 4:3b, 11; 5:6a, 19; 7:13a - \underline{God} loves to \underline{bless} those who repent and walk in His works and ways.

Faithful service to God is never about <u>position</u>; but, it is always about our <u>attitude</u> towards God and his right to define and <u>inspect</u> our actions and attitudes. To whom much is given much is required, but it is also true that it is required of servants that they be found <u>faithful</u> because that is what God <u>rewards</u>. Part of that faithfulness is carrying out my duties for the Lord and not for <u>men</u>.
