The Spirit of the Lord

1 Samuel 16

Introduction:

"Spirit of the Lord" - Genesis 1:2; <u>Isaiah 61:1</u>; Numbers 11:25; 27:16-18; Judges 3:10; 6:34; 11:29; 13-16; <u>1 Samuel 10:6</u>

Summary: Postmodernism teaches that all points of view are <u>equal</u>, they each deserve to be respected and no point of view is the only point of view. That is simply <u>not true!</u>

1 Samuel 16:1-13 - What God Sees

Precept: God sees things the way they should be seen; God sees the <u>heart</u>. This Hebrew word, 'heart' points to 'one's <u>thoughts</u>, emotions and <u>intents</u>'.

Summary: "A man after God's own heart" means "a man of God's own <u>choosing</u>, a man that God has set his heart on".

1 Samuel 16:14-23 - What Man Perceives

Question: Do I, do we, understand the nature of <u>influences</u>? Do I, do we, understand the nature of <u>lost</u> influences?

Precept: This story points me to one area where influence is universal; music.

Summary: As a child and young person I choose to stay out of environments that are void of <u>God's</u> influence, of the influence of the <u>Holy Spirit</u>. As a mature Christian adult I choose to enter such environments when <u>God</u> directs me; otherwise I choose to stay away.

Conclusion: God sees others properly and if we are influenced by God and the <u>beam</u> in our own eyes is addressed we can see things the way God sees them. <u>Samuel</u>, had to learn this lesson and so do each of us.

There is nothing <u>special</u> about a person who can see things that others fail to see. Thank God that there are such people around us, that we can turn to for spiritual insight and guidance—but <u>God</u> gets the credit.

It is very likely that David was <u>naïve</u> about Saul's inner struggles, but he did bring something to Saul's court that was valuable; he was a stabilizing <u>influence</u>, not only with his music but also with his <u>attitude</u> such that Saul "loved David" and we should understand this Hebrew phrase to mean that he <u>really liked</u> David, he favored him. Never dismiss the <u>simple</u> influence of the least of God's children—God can use it for his glory.

There are people that God has chosen and gifted, and their great temptation is to take <u>credit</u> for and to use their gifts for their own <u>enrichment</u>. This is very misguided. We should recognize what God has done in someone but not elevate them, rather thank God for his blessing on us through them and <u>pray</u> for them that God continues to rule their lives.
