## The Turning Point

1 Samuel 15

## Introduction:

Amalek - Amalek was one of Esau's grandsons (Genesis 36:11-12).

1 Samuel 15:1-11 - <u>First</u>, Samuel reminds Saul that he anointed him king (15:1); <u>second</u>, he comes with words from the "*Lord of hosts*" an <u>authoritative</u> revelation from God (15:2). <u>Third</u>, Israel had failed to destroy Amalek (<u>Exodus 17:14-16</u>).

**Turning Point** - 1 Samuel 15:9 - They decided what should be <u>despised</u> and <u>destroyed</u> and kept what they thought was <u>worthy</u>. (1 Samuel 15:11).

**Precept**: To truly obey the Lord we really need to see things the way <u>God</u> sees them.

1 Samuel 15:12-35

Holding Saul Accountable - 1 Samuel 15:12-23 - <u>First</u>, there is a determination to <u>face</u> a person who has done wrong (15:12). <u>Second</u>, Samuel <u>confronted</u> Saul (15:13-21) and <u>corrected</u> his wrong impressions. <u>Third</u>, Samuel provides a <u>precept</u> that governs actions that are a response to what the Lord commands (15:22-23).

Saul's response - 1 Samuel 15:24-31

<u>Listening</u> to people - 1 Samuel 15:24 <u>Tearing</u> Samuel's garment - 1 Samuel 15:27-29

**Precept**: When I sin before God as a <u>citizen</u> it is not the same as when I sin before God as the <u>Prime Minister</u>. To whom much is given much is required and that certainly applies to <u>accountability</u>.

Samuel holds <u>Agaa</u> accountable - 1 Samuel 15:32-33

<u>First</u>, I would do better to see my sin the way <u>God</u> sees it if I am going to understand God's wrath at sin.

<u>Second</u>, I would do better to see the <u>influence</u> of sin on me the way God sees it if I am going to walk in the works and ways of Jesus Christ.

Separation and grief - 1 Samuel 15:34-16:1

**Conclusion**: This story is framed by the grief of the Lord that he had made Saul king (15:10, 35) and is one of the <u>darkest</u> moments in the early life of Israel.

Why is it so rare that we find a competent, wise, humble and honest leader—someone with a good heart? For this reason <u>scrutiny</u> and <u>accountability</u> are vital to a long term healthy <u>family</u> and <u>organization</u>.

When I fail to obey God I <u>increase</u> evil, I magnify <u>disobedience</u>. The greater my <u>responsibility</u> the more important is my obedience. (<u>1 Corinthians 11:1</u>; 4:16-17; Philippians 3:17-19; 1 Thessalonians 1:6; 2 Thessalonians 3:7; Jeremiah 5:5-6)
