"Challenging Relationships"

1 Samuel 19-20

Introduction: Is it ever right to tell a \underline{lie} ? As we read these stories people tell lies to $\underline{protect}$ David—is this right?

Saul & David - 1 Samuel 19:1-17

Summary: Saul has issues with David and his carnal inclinations are towards jealousy and envy and he has no inner help to resist those inclinations.

Saul & God - 1 Samuel 19:18-24 - Saul is intent on capturing and killing David but <u>God</u> steps in and <u>prevents</u> him from carrying out his scheme.

Precept: The Spirit of God in this story was a <u>divine force</u> that these men were unable to resist, because these men were not <u>men of God</u>; they were powerless to <u>resist</u> the influence of the Spirit of God.

Summary: The power of the Spirit of God is always greater than the power of <u>hatred</u>, <u>envy</u> and <u>jealousy</u>—always! That truth will never change and the <u>circumstances</u> of life have no bearing on it.

David & Jonathan - 1 Samuel 20:1-42 - Jonathan's words reveal his true heart.

The Covenant Plan - 1 Samuel 20:1-23

The Disgraceful Revelation - 1 Samuel 20:24-34

The Emotional End - 1 Samuel 20:35-42

Summary: There are always <u>consequences</u> to our choices and <u>commitments</u> and the choice that these two men made was no exception. The best part of the story is that God will honor their <u>loyalty</u> to <u>truth</u> as each man keeps his word. If my loyalty is to <u>people</u> I am on my own.

Conclusion: Saul had the Spirit of God resting upon him as did David. Only their continued <u>loyalty</u> to <u>truth</u> blessed their future.

When our relationships with people are void of $\underline{\text{truth}}$ we enjoy a very tenuous and potentially troubling $\underline{\text{future}}$; but if the truth is the central part of any relationship it has the power to honor the $\underline{\text{Lord}}$, and bless the $\underline{\text{future}}$.

There are relationships that experience <u>physical</u> separation but that does not mean that there has to be <u>relational</u> separation and this story demonstrates it. Make a covenant today to live in harmony with God's <u>truth</u> and you will have true friends all over the world.

David and Jonathan had legitimate <u>fear</u> but they chose to give their energy to something that combats that fear, <u>faithfulness</u> to goodness and kindness, the essence of true covenant. They chose to individually be faithful to their <u>commitments</u> to each other no matter what happened and believe that their friend was truly seeking their <u>best</u> future. This is at the heart of true <u>friendship</u>. A true friend is naturally attracted to <u>faithfulness</u> and that leads to the defeat of <u>fear</u>—choose faithfulness.
