"Navigating Enemies"

1 Samuel 26-27

Introduction:

Domestic Enemies - 1 Samuel 26

Abishia is part of a family of three <u>soldiers</u>, Abishai, Asahel and Joab, all sons of Zeruiah (1 Chronicles 2:16).

Precept: The Hebrew term translated "deep sleep" is used elsewhere in the O.T. for sleep that is induced by <u>God</u>, most of the time for individuals but here for 3000 men and their King. This was <u>divine intervention</u> and <u>God's</u> way of protecting David.

Summary: It is important to realize that David's faith is growing as he learns that God is for him, God can and will protect him; David's stealth and cleverness seems <u>special</u> until we read the end of verse 12; God is <u>providentially</u> caring for the future king.

The Lord's Anointed

<u>Foreign Enemies</u> - 1 Samuel 27 - This chapter begins with <u>self-talk</u>; it's a common activity in the minds and hearts of <u>distressed</u> people and that includes God's people.

Anger & Faith

Precept: There will be times when you need to be <u>encouraged</u> in the Lord. Sometimes that is on <u>you</u>, while other times that is a burden that <u>God</u> puts on a friend or someone who knows you, loves you and knows what is going on.

Precept: God's people should realize that <u>God's</u> ways are always the best ways and in the end point the most people to the ways of the Lord. Choose your <u>influences</u> wisely!

Summary: The beauty of chapter 26 is that we can see God protecting <u>David</u> as he tiptoes through the camp of Saul and in the end Saul returns home embarrassed. In Chapter 27 two things happen that God has <u>ordained</u>; Ziklag becomes the Royal City of the kings of Israel and old Canaanite tribes that God wanted erased were decimated by God's servant and this happened as David manipulated a Philistine king.

Conclusion: David's response to Abishai is underpinned with $\underline{\text{theology}}$. What should my reactions and responses be to those who rule and lead me? (Matthew 4:1-11; Luke 4:1-13)

Enemies are far and near; sometimes we know them and at other times we don't. The person behind these enemies is <u>Satan</u> either as a <u>primary</u> influence or as a <u>subtle</u> influence. The enemy's first effort is to distract you from <u>obeying</u> God and then to do less than <u>fully</u> obey God—resist with all of your might by simply obeying God and the <u>enemy</u> will flee.

Chapter 27 is void of any references to God and reveals a story of David navigating tricky circumstances and pagan influences. God is not consulted but he is <u>faithful</u> even when David is not overtly seeking the Lord's guidance. So how do I discern the Lord's will when I am surrounded by <u>tricky</u> circumstances and <u>pagan</u> influences? .
