"Returning Evil for Good"

1 Samuel 25

Introduction: 'Personalities' and 'power' play an important role in 1 Samuel 25. The tension in this story revolves around <u>wealth</u> but the main point turns on how David will <u>respond</u> to someone who 'returns evil for good'.

Samuel's Death - 1 Samuel 25:1

<u>Foolish People</u> - 1 Samuel 25:2-13 The Hebrew name "Nabal" is the word "<u>fool</u>" whereas Abagail, his wife, is the word "<u>discerning</u>".

Precept: Anyone can act foolishly; it is a natural trait of <u>children</u>. Young men act foolishly and need <u>instruction</u>; but when a mature or aged man acts foolishly there is a real problem. David needed proper <u>instruction</u>—and God would provide it.

Wise Servants - 1 Samuel 25:14-31

Precept: Both of these men needed to learn a lesson—first David, Israel's future king and then Nabal. God would have to <u>intercede</u> for both of these men.

Thoughts on Anger

Anger is a primary <u>emotion</u>. It resides in Nabal, and David. Nabal does not learn from this lesson and David has to learn his lesson from a wise woman who knows both of these men.

Ephesians 4:26: The text uses two forms of the Greek word for <u>anger</u>, "be angry, <u>but</u>..." in the first phrase, "don't rest on anger" or "don't let an angry <u>mood</u> rest on you" in the second phrase. Anger has it's place but it should never have a <u>permanent</u> place in us. (Proverbs 22:24-25)

The Value of Wise Counsel

David needs wise counsel and God provides it, ($\underline{James 1:5, 19}$) and on the other side of that issue is my response to life around me, I am called to be quick to hear, slow to \underline{speak} and slow to anger. ($\underline{Proverbs 4:4-9}$)

<u>Godly Influence</u> - 1 Samuel 25:32-35 - Seeing the big <u>picture</u> is a large part of retreating from anger and rage.

<u>God's Providence</u> - 1 Samuel 25:36-38 - This is the providential <u>hand</u> of God, a controlled and measured hand; unlike David's which was harsh and out of control.

<u>David & Women</u> - 1 Samuel 25:39-44 - <u>Deuteronomy 17:15-20</u>

Conclusion: David manifests a <u>teachable</u> spirit. When Saul was offended in 1 Samuel 21 he looked for a man who would kill all the men associated with that priest and Doeg the Edomite stepped up; that would not be the response of David to the offense of Nabal; by the Lord, <u>Abigail</u> stood in his way.

Abigail's words to David are the <u>longest</u> speech by a woman in the O.T. In it she interceded for her <u>husband</u> and his servants; she prophetically revealed <u>David's</u> destiny as the man who would begin the dynasty of kings in Israel; and she <u>prevented</u> David from judgment for his intended murder; an act of disobedience described in the Torah.
